

Application for Student Assistantship
Department of Anthropology
2019-2020

The Department of Anthropology is authorized to hire a limited number of student assistants for 2019-2020. These assistants will help professors teach certain courses, primarily 1000-level introductory courses. Activities could include marking, invigilating, tutoring, or leading group discussions, as well as other activities.

Applicants must be declared Anthropology majors. The stipend is approximately \$508 per term, or \$580 for students in their final honours year. Assistants will be expected to work 35-40 hours per term.

To apply, complete this application and submit a paper copy of it to Department of Anthropology Chairperson Dr. Rylan Higgins. Submit it to Dr. Higgins personally; submit it to the Department of Anthropology Secretary in the Department Office, who in turn will give it to Dr. Higgins; or place it in the drop box beneath the windows of the Department Office, sealed in an envelope addressed to Dr. Higgins.

For both Fall 2019 and Winter 2020, the deadline for receipt of applications is **5:00 pm, Friday September 13th**. Applications must be complete, including academic transcripts, to be considered.

In ranking and hiring applicants, the Department will take into account their overall academic record, course history in anthropology, other relevant experience, and suitability for course needs. Where possible, preference will be given to honours students.

4. Consider the anthropological subfields of archaeology, biological anthropology, forensic anthropology, linguistic anthropology, and socio-cultural anthropology. Which of these subfields are you most interested in assisting? Which least interested?
